

On Goldman Sachs' reckonings, the cost of the 2008 credit crisis, or GFC (Global Financial Crisis) as is its moniker, is \$US4.6 trillion, and counting.

It has even surpassed the aggregate cost of the Marshall Plan, the Louisiana Purchase, the Race to the Moon, the Savings and Loans Crisis, the Korean War, the New Deal, the Invasion of Iraq, the Vietnam War and NASA combined. And that's inflation adjusted.

The only event which even comes close in terms of cost, says Goldman, is World War II, which cost \$US288 billion, or \$US3.6 trillion in inflation-adjusted terms, and that lasted three years and nine months (for the Americans at least).

Ron Myers recently joined a group who toured the battlefields of France where so many of our young Australians were KIA. Ron is writing an account of this very interesting tour, and we are hopeful to present it to our members in the next issue of *Muzzle Blast*.

HISTORY

The following are extracts from records held in our archives:

Annual General Meeting held on 24 October, 1945

"On 23 March, 1945, a meeting of ex-members of the Battalion was called at the YMCA Pitt Street and our Association was formed There were approx. 70 present, some of whom were still serving.

Membership

At present there are 80 names on our books.

Up to the present juncture, membership fee has only been 2/- per head for 12 months, but it is proposed to amend the Constitution at this meeting to alter the fee to 10/- for the first year and 2/- thereafter in order to establish a reserve for correspondence, etc., and to come into line with those chaps who have paid their fee at the unit."

Statement of Receipts and Payments to 24/10/45

Shows income of 21.1 (twenty-one pounds, one shilling) with a bank balance of 1.9 (one pound, nine shillings). The cost of refreshments on Anzac Day 1945 was 7.8.6 (seven pounds, eight shillings and sixpence).

Committee Meeting No. 1 was held on 6th April, 1945, at Park Lane Mansions, Rushcutters Bay.

Those present were: Messrs. Ward, Williams, Jacob, Foster, Donohoe and Edwards.

After various amendments to the Constitution it was moved by Mr. Williams and seconded by Mr. Foster:

"That the Hon. Secretary should take appropriate initial action with a view to preparing a Battalion History" (35 years later our History was published in 1980.)

"That any Committee man failing to attend 3 consecutive committee meetings without obtaining leave of absence shall forfeit his position."

Announced

"Lieut. Laurie Lee and Lieut. Gus Longhurst were killed in action since our last meeting. Following the receipt of their commissions they were posted to Infantry Battalions and I know that they would be just as highly thought of in these battalions as they were in ours. Suitable letters were sent to the parents on behalf of the Association."

Committee Meeting No. 7, 17 July, 1946

"It was moved by Mr. Ferguson that Mr. Mitchell make enquiries at Sargeants regarding a


permanent booking of a hall for Alamein Day and Anzac Day, also cost of catering. If total cost of function is not more than 10/- (one dollar), booking to be made."

This meeting was Chaired by E. Macarthur-Onslow as President.

Ed: As a matter of interest, all minute books from the first meetings are held in our archives. They make very interesting reading.

LUXURY TRAVEL



The sleeping/living quarters on board a troopship moving our Battalion to New Guinea in 1943. The vessel was a 'Liberty' ship which had a bad habit of breaking in half in a heavy sea (so it was reported by the American crew)!

SATTELBERG, NEW GUINEA



Bill Keihne and Mick Mahoney (B2 Platoon) in action at 'White Rock' at Sattelberg. B Company was supporting the famous 2/48 Battalion and it was here that 'Diver' Derrick won the Victoria Cross (he was awarded the DCM in the Middle-East).

B company had 12 Vickers guns in action. Alf Mooney and Bert Steen were killed as a result of shell fire. There were a number wounded. It was in the shelling that Ron Myers (No. 1 Gunner) had his gun receive a direct hit. He was very lucky.

VALE – PADDY O'DRISCOLL

All those from the NSW Association who attended the joint NSW/Queensland reunions at Sawtell and Port Macquarie remember Paddy with affection. Paddy was the Secretary of the Queensland Association when the reunions were first organised — they were held for at least 23 years. Adrian Simpson was the Secretary in this State. Paddy never wrote letters but would ring from Brisbane to the Gulf Country — on one occasion he was warned, "This call is going to cost you a fortune". The answer was, "No worry, mate." Of course, he was a long time employee of the Postal/Telephone Service!!

Paddy was held in high regard by all who were fortunate enough to meet up with him — a 'gentle giant' with a keen sense of humour and a great supporter of the Battalion.

IN FLANDERS FIELDS

By Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, MD (1872-1918), Canadian Army

In Flanders fields the poppies grow Between the crosses row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

McCrae's *In Flanders Fields* remains to this day one of the most memorable war poems ever written. It is a lasting legacy of the terrible battle in the Ypres salient in the spring of 1915. Here is the story of the making of that poem:

Although he had been a doctor for years and had served in the South African War, it was impossible to get used to the suffering, the screams, and the blood here, and Major John McCrae had seen and heard enough in his dressing station to last him a lifetime. As a surgeon attached to the 1st Field Artillery Brigade, Major McCrae, who had joined the McGill faculty in 1900 after graduating from the University of Toronto, had spent 17 days treating injured men — Canadians, British, Indians, French and Germans — in the Ypres salient.

It had been an ordeal that he had hardly thought possible. McCrae later wrote of it.


LAST POST
