

VALE

LIEUT. GEOFFREY WILLIAM WENTWORTH BOUCHER NX22934



20.04.1921 - 18.09.2006

Geoff was born in Corowa in Victoria. His father was employed by the Bank of New South Wales which resulted in the family being moved to various locations, e.g. Balranald, Taralga, Campbelltown. He attended the Hurlstone Agricultural College where he was involved with the Boy Scouts and commenced competitive cycle racing with which he achieved considerable success.

Geoff joined the Bank of New South Wales at Camden Branch and when World War II broke out he was serving with the Royal New South Wales Lancers based at Parramatta. He joined our Battalion when 'Torpy' (Brigadier D.A. Whitehead, CBE, DSO*, MC, ED) C.O. of the Lancers, formed the Battalion and brought with him a number of Lancers.

He was an original member of the Battalion and served in the various campaigns in the Middle East, including the Battle of El Alamein. He was wounded in action and was lucky to escape with one small wound in the shoulder by a bullet which narrowly missed his head. Mick Riley, who was with him at the time, said Geoff remained on duty and the wound was not reported, hence it is not recorded in the Unit History.

On his return from the Middle East he was commissioned into the R.A.A.S.C.

He rejoined the Bank on discharge and was posted to various branches including Sydney, Suva in Fiji, Nauru and Robinvale (Vic.). He retired in 1982 from the Lane Cove Branch where he was Manager. At that time the Unit History was published and he looked after the finances for that project.

Geoff was a keen traveller. He did a trek in Nepal and walked the Routeburn and Milford Tracks in New Zealand. With his late wife they visited most countries in the world, ten months touring U.K. and Europe and five months in the U.S.A.

It was only deteriorating health that caused these globetrotters to cease their travelling.

Geoff served on the Association's Committee for many years and was always a keen supporter of all our activities. He displayed great courage, although very ill, to go the full distance of the March on Anzac Day with the help of his carer and then to attend the luncheon.

All members of the Association extend sincere sympathy to Geoff's family for their sad loss.

This tribute is based on the eulogy delivered by Geoff's brother, John, at the service conducted by our Chaplain, Canon Ray Bomford. MAJOR GENERAL JOHN RAYMOND BROADBENT CBE, DSO Ed

Major General Broadbent passed away on 27th October at the age of 92 years. He was an outstanding soldier, well known and highly regarded by all troops, particularly of the 20th Brigade and the 2/17th Battalion. He joined the A.I.F. early in 1940 from the Sydney University Regiment and served with the 2/17th Battalion for the duration of the war. The battalion was heavily committed in all the battles in Tobruk and El Alamein, and then he was Commanding Officer in the New Guinea and Borneo campaigns.

He was Hon. Life Member of the 2/17th Bn. Association and President of the 9th Division Council

The General led the 9th Division in the Anzac Day march in April this year.

(The Division took up its position at Alamein in July 1942 and was involved in much fighting prior to the October battle.)

On the 64th anniversary, it is appropriate that we remember our men who did not return home from the Middle East, New Guinea, Tarakan and Borneo.

LEST WE FORGET

In addition, about 180 of our Battalion troops were wounded in action.

In the various campaigns the 9th Division suffered 2,732 killed in action, 7,501 wounded and 1,836 taken prisoner. It was the most highly decorated of all the 2nd A.I.F. Divisions, receiving 393 awards for bravery, which included seven Victoria Cross Medals. The Division also received a total of 681 Mentioned in Despatches.

ANZAC DAY

I saw a kid marchin' with medals on his chest. He marched alongside Diggers, marchin' six abreast. He knew it was Anzac Day, he walked along with pride, He did his best to keep in step with Diggers by his side.

And when the march was over the kid was rather tired.

A Digger said "Whose medals, son?", to which the kid replied:
"They belong to my daddy but he did not come back,
He died up in New Guinea on a lonely jungle track."

The kid looked rather sad, then a tear came to his eye.

The Digger said: "Don't worry my son, and I will tell you why.

Your daddy marched with us today — all the bloomin' way.

We Diggers know that he was there — it's like that on Anzac Day."

The kid looked rather puzzled and didn't understand. But the Digger went on talking and started to wave his hand. "For this great land we live in, there's a price we have to pay, And for this thing called freedom, the Diggers had to pay.

"For we all love fun and merriment in this country where we live. The price was that some soldier, his precious life must give. For you to go to school, my lad, and worship God at will, Someone had to pay the price, so the Diggers paid the bill.

Your daddy died for us, my son — for all things good and true. I wonder if you can understand the things I've said to you?" The kid looked up at the Digger, just for a little while, And with a changed expression, said, with a lovely smile: "I know my daddy marched here today, this our Anzac Day, I know he did, I know he did, all the bloomin' way!"

SIGN OF THE TIMES

We are informed that recently the 2/3rd Anti-Tank Regiment Association has ceased to operate.

As all 9 Division members know, this was a very famous regiment that was involved in all the campaigns of the Division — Middle East (including Tobruk and the Battle of El Alamein), New Guinea and Borneo.

In an introduction to the Unit History, Major-General W.J.V. Windeyer, C.B., C.B.E., D.S.O., E.D. wrote (in part):

"It is a story of heroic tasks discharged with heroism, and of commonplace tasks done uncommonly well."

B2 Platoon have every reason to remember the Regiment with affection. At the Battle of El Alamein when things were really 'hot' and the Platoon had its gun pits near the 'Blockhouse', the Germans positioned an 88mm field gun at short range and the gun crew immediately went into action. Behind our positions the 2/3rd Anti-Tank Regiment had a battery of 6 pounders and the crew was able to shoot — the first round hit the porte (ammunition carrier) and, of course, that put the 88 out of action with considerable loss of life on the enemy side.

After the battle, members of B2 inspected the 88 gun and found a round in the barrel which was aimed directly at the gun pit of Ron Myers — so he and his team were fortunate that the 2/3rd Anti-Tank got their round away before the Germans could shoot.

The 2/3rd Anti-Tank Regiment Association was a great supporter of the reunions held in Orange, Tamworth and the City with very good attendances, and our members had many friends in that Unit. It is a sad end to a famous Regiment.

DIGGERS ON LEAVE

They were on seven days leave in Cairo in December 1942, only a few weeks before we sailed for home.

A FATHER AND TWO SONS

The father was James Lynch (NX24868) and his sons, Joe (NX178055) and James (NX99052) — J.M. and J.A. respectively. All three joined our Battalion and served in 'A' Company.

Jim Lynch (father) saw active service in World War I with the 1st Infantry Bn. where he was awarded the Military Medal (the actual medal is in the possession of Joe). On joining the A.I.F. he was 50 years of age but presented himself as 40 and was accepted. He joined our Battalion and saw service in the Middle East. On his return he was discharged.

When Joe decided to join the Army he was 17 years of age and asked his father's approval to present himself as an older candidate. He was accepted and joined our Battalion.

Joe's older brother, James, had already joined our Battalion and they both had service is the Islands and Borneo.

Joe tells us that "some of the originals like Alex Starkey and Scotty Dill used to tell me some wonderful stories about Dad".

Another in the family, Peter, younger than Joe, served in the Korean War.

This is a story well worth telling as an outstanding contribution of the Lynch family in the service of our country.

Joe is the only one with us now. He usually reports to the assembly in O'Connell Street on Anzac Day and goes the full distance of the march assisted by his grandson, Bobby Broadhurst. Next year he is hopeful of joining us at the Anzac Day luncheon. He and Bobby will receive a warm welcome.

ANOTHER FAMILY THAT SERVED OUR COUNTRY WELL

Ron Brunker's father served with the 4th Battalion A.I.F. in World War I. He enlisted on 12th August, 1914, was wounded in action at Lone Pine, Gallipoli in 1915, and was discharged in Sydney in 1916. If that was not enough action, he enlisted again on 22nd June, 1940 (NX56725) and served with the 22nd Brigade A.I.F., 8th Division. As a P.O.W. he worked on the Burma-Siam Railway and died on 9th September, 1943, after a leg amputation. He is buried in the Thanbyazayat War Cemetery, Burma.

Ron's brother, Esmond (NX87902) served with the 2/33rd Battalion. He enlisted in 1942, and was in New Guinea (Kokoda Trail), Ramu Valley, Dutch Borneo and Balikpapan. He was discharged in Sydney in 1946.

Ron Brunker has been a committeeman for many years and is a very active member of our Association. He served with 'C' Company of the Battalion.

9 DIVISION CHURCH PARADE

As a matter of interest, the Garrison Church has a long history that goes back to the very early colonial days when the British garrisons held their church parades there. In 1997 our Battalion plaque was placed on the north wall of the church. The dedication was to perpetuate the memory of the Battalion and its achievements for future generations. It was at this ceremony that the late Lt. Col. Frank Lavan introduced the concept of Associate Membership, which has proved to be so successful.

It is recommended to members and friends that a visit to the Garrison Church is well worthwhile, if at all possible.
